Introduction

The adoption of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development demands profound reflection and a sharp ability to understand and navigate complexity. The interconnectedness and indivisibility of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) challenge siloed and fragmented approaches to development, forcing the international community to rethink the work of multilateral cooperation in addressing some of the world's most pressing challenges.

The UN System Leadership Framework sets forth **systems thinking** as one of the four behaviours that international leaders need to adopt in their leadership practice in order to move towards the full realization of the 2030 Agenda. Leaders are now asked to: think across and beyond the specific area of their expertise and mandate; analyse their environment as a set of complex ecosystems; discern their organising principles as well as the linkages, interactions, dependencies and power distribution among components and constituencies; and strategically identify leverage points to achieve maximum impact.

These new approaches and competencies call for a shift from linear thinking to non-linear systems thinking. In the context of sustainable development, this entails building on and working through the lenses of five intertwined dimensions: people, planet, prosperity, peace and partnership.

Leading for Sustainable Development has been specifically designed to enable senior international leaders to think systemically and act cooperatively in their work on sustainable development in order to achieve the greatest impact.


Cost of participation
