# UN Summer Academy 2021



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
## Introduction

Amidst the global uncertainty and disruption brought about by COVID-19 in the world today, global action and dialogue are more critical than ever. The second virtual UN Summer Academy in 2021 highlighted important issues which are required to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, focusing on climate change, economic transformation, and health and wellbeing,

The UN Summer Academy 2021 marks its 10th anniversary and its 5th year in the City of Bonn, a sustainability hub and host to organizations of the United Nations for the past 25 years. This virtual edition follows a very successful introduction in the virtual format in 2020.

The UN Summer Academy 2021 was a five-day action-packed event that took place online from 23 to 27 August 2021. The Academy featured global sustainable development experts, members of government, city councils and renowned speakers. With the help of different learning methodologies, more than one hundred participants from all over the world convened to discuss tackling the complex problems that humankind is facing today, especially in the post-pandemic era.

In terms of the broader context, this year's UN Summer Academy was centered on the theme of "Redesigning for a sustainable future". The programme explored sustainable development in the post-COVID-19 context from a multi-sectoral perspective, focusing on three critical themes: health and well-being, economic transformation, and climate action. Participants looked at how transformative conceptual approaches of systems thinking, futures thinking, and design thinking can help address these issues in a complex and volatile context.





The five-day programme consisted of the following key blocks:

- 1. Daily **plenaries**, which brought all participants together for expert inputs on topics related to redesigning for a sustainable future. The plenaries explored thematic areas of health and well-being, economic transformation and the climate crisis.
- 2. Interactive **side events**, which offered a variety of expert perspectives and social activities.
- 3. **Working group sessions**, in which small groups of participants collaborated to apply the concepts of systems thinking, futures thinking and design thinking to unpack the thematic areas presented during the plenary sessions.
- 4. Virtual **networking spaces**, in which participants connected amongst themselves, exchanged ideas across sectors and countries and learnt about inspiring sustainable development initiatives around the world.

The **networking spaces** included the **UNSSC Coffee Bar** forum, the **Share Fair Gallery Walk**, and the **Seat in Bonn** Space.

The following sections provide a glimpse into each of the blocks mentioned above. A complete agenda for the event is attached as an annexure.

## Plenaries

Day 1: Opening of the UN Summer Academy 2021

In Plenary 1, UNSSC Director Jafar Javan opened the UN Summer Academy. Sandhya Balasubrahmanyam and the rest of the UN Summer Academy team introduced the theme of "Redesigning for a sustainable future" and the agenda for the week, setting ground rules, and sharing some details about the cohort. UNSSC Knowledge Centre for Sustainable Development Head of Office Patrick van Weerelt chaired a panel on ten years of the UN Summer Academy amidst a changing sustainable development landscape, featuring Adriana Jacinto, Simona Costanzo Sow and Sandhya Balasubrahmanyam. Mhabeni Bona summarized key concepts of the 2030 Agenda for sustainable development.



## Day 2: A systems perspective on health and wellbeing

In **Plenary 2**, participants met across working groups to introduce themselves, each sharing an object that represented sustainability to them. Systems scientist **Will Allen**, Learning for Sustainability, introduced key concepts of systems thinking and how it is a useful approach for framing wicked problems. **Maryam Bigdeli**, WHO Representative to Morocco, spoke on applying systems thinking to health systems. Graphic facilitator **Desiree Llanos Dee**, Tofu Creatives, wowed everyone with her live scribing of the discussions.

## Day 3: Futures thinking on economic transformation


In Plenary 3, futures thinking expert **Adam Sharpe**, Director of Learning at Metafuture, introduced futures thinking, looking at how to reveal and map out emerging issues. **Laurel Patterson**, Head of the SDG Integration at UNDP, unpacked what we mean by "economic transformation", asking whether current economic systems are fit for purpose, for people and planet.






## Day 4: Inclusive Action for Sustainable Development

In **Plenary 4**, **Youssef Nassef**, Director, Adaptation Division at the UNFCCC, opened with a keynote on the mindset shifts needed to create systemic climate transformations. **Koko Warner**, Manager, Impacts, Vulnerabilities and Risks subprogramme at the UNFCCC, spoke of the key challenges and opportunities of the climate crisis and shared stories on innovative ideas for the planet.

**Agnes Cserhati**, Founder and CEO, AC PowerCoaching, explained how design thinking is first and foremost about thinking, and how it can be used to approach challenges innovatively. Sandhya Balasubrahmanyam then facilitated a fireside chat with Koko Warner and Agnes Cserhati, on transformative change for the climate, and how design thinking can help.








## Day 5: UN Summer Academy Closing

In **Plenary 5**, we were honoured to have **Katja Dörner**, Lord Mayor of the City of Bonn join us to felicitate participants during the closing of the Summer Academy. Frau Dörner reiterated the importance of sustainability for the city of Bonn. She was followed by **Patrick Van Weerelt**, Head of KCSD Bonn, who shared some thoughts on how to make sustainable development a reality in our daily lives. The participants were entertained by a short concert from **Ahmed Nyei**, a local artist and sustainability enthusiast.



## **Side Events**

#### **Trend Talks:**

## 1. Understanding the role of blockchain in sustainable economy

**Thy-Diep Ta ("Yip")**, Co-Founder Unit Ventures & DLT Talents gave a talk on how blockchain and the internet of value catalyze the shift from a shareholder to a stakeholder economy. The speaker shared her journey to blockchain technology, and why she chose blockchain technology as a means to contribute to a sustainable future.

#### 2. Asia's largest urban farm

**Kotchakorn Voraakhom**, Chairwoman of the Climate Change Working Group, shared her journey as a landscape architect in building innovative landscape solutions and making Bangkok more resilient to climate change. She explained how Urban Rooftop Farm (Asia's largest urban farm) works, and how she converted urban spaces into spaces that produce food and mitigate flooding.

## 3. Innovation to feed a billion people

In this trend talk, **Angela Wyan**, Head of Field Innovation and Nobel Peace Prize Awardee 2020, shed light on how to achieve a world without hunger through creative solutions. She shared her team's experience on innovation, especially as a means to end global hunger, and explained the challenges the team faced and as well as how they overcome those challenges.

#### 4. The Making of a Power Kitchen

This trend talk discussed the ways in which one can reuse one's kitchen waste to produce biodiesel, bioenergy and organic fertilizer. **Márcia Werle** shared her journey to become the founder of Biotechnos and demonstrated the technology behind the reuse of residual kitchen fats to produce biodiesel.

#### 5. A Virtual excursion to a transforming city

In this trend talk hour, **Paulyn Duman**, SDG Learncast podcast host highlighted the transformational example of a German city that moved from being economically powered by a centuries-old mining industry to a more sustainable future. The participants were guided on a virtual excursion tour to a fictitious mining city.

### 6. The promise of new Eco-Social Contract

**Paul Ladd**, Director, United Nations Research Institute for Social Development (UNRISD) presented research on the ways to build forward better after COVID-19. He explained the new eco-social contract as a means to deliver on the 2030 Agenda from UNRISD perspectives.

## 7. Living in the age of disinformation

**Julian Jaursch**, Project Director SNV gave a trend talk on why we fall for 'fake' news and what can be done about it. He explained the difference between 'disinformation' and 'fake' news, its increasing relevance today, and why we should care.

### 8. The Future world of Humans and Robots

**Jeanne Lim**, Co-founder & CEO of beingAl and co-developer of Sophia, the human-like robot gave an extremely interesting talk on how our children can cocreate a positive future with Al. She shared her biggest hopes and fears for technological advances and discussed why emotional intelligence is critical to harnessing the power of Al for sustainability.







## Communicating for Complex Sustainable Solutions

Rafaella Ferraz Ziegert, Associate fellow at UNSSC Knowledge Centre for Sustainable Development, hosted a session that explored the importance of stakeholder engagement and creative solutions for communication and dialogue for decision making on sustainable issues. Participants were presented a scenario case for a city and asked to discuss potential solutions that kept in mind the interests and needs of the public.

## Inkredible Tools: Visual storytelling for development

**Desiree Llanos Dee** and **Nityalila Saulo**, co-founders of Tofu Creatives, discussed the power of visual storytelling to tackle complex development issues. The session highlighted how visual storytelling acts as a tool that helps communicate decisions better. The participants used design and doodling to storify the future they want to create.

One takeaway from this session: As Desiree said to participants at the end of the session, pause, take a minute to look around you, and recognize that everything you can see started as a drawing that someone imagined. Similarly, "Political movements, personal movements, all begin with people imagining another way of existing." (Neil Gaiman)

## City of Bonn - World BEAThoven Project



# Working Group Sessions



The participants connected the 2030 Agenda to their life and work in the "Sailing to 2030" exercise, and explored the interconnected nature of sustainable development in the "Megatrends" exercise.




# Working Group 2

In **Working group session 2**, the participants practiced using systems thinking to frame challenges. In a roleplay exercise, the fictional governor of Zeus state, Governor Patrick, presented his policy plan for the wicked problem of COVID-19. Playing the role of a multi-sectoral panel of experts, participants used the iceberg model to consider the events of COVID-19 from a systemic perspective, and then offered their suggestions to Governor Patrick in 2-minute elevator pitches.




# Working Group 3


In **Working group session 3**, the participants used futures thinking to create alternative scenarios for economic transformation, identify a preferred future, and look at how to "backcast" from the preferred future to articulate the steps needed to get there from the present.



#### **Working Group 4**

In **Working group session 4**, the participants used design thinking methods to prototype ideas to address the climate challenge of creating a climate-friendly city. Each group used empathy mapping to consider the challenge from an enduser perspective, and the four categories method to evaluate and challenge ideas. They developed several iterations of their idea, presenting it to climate experts and refining it based on feedback.





# Networking Spaces






# The UNSSC Coffee Bar

This networking space allowed the participants to get to know the city of Bonn and to take a virtual seat next to a landmark in order to network and discuss sustainable development initiatives of mutual interest with fellow participants.



# Howspace

The UN Summer Academy 2021 was organised on Howspace, an online event platform that enables enhanced networking and peer-learning, and brings social learning to the forefront of learning for development. The platform worked extremely well to host the different aspects of the week-long event and was very well received by the users. From the user perspective, the tool enabled users to access all the content, the links to all the separate sessions and events, any information shared by participants from a single space, while also allowing them engaging and highly interactive ways of networking with participants from all over the world.



on a high note.






After last week, I needed a couple of days to reflect on everything I had learned.


